GENERAL RULES

Objective: To develop leadership, initiative, self-reliance, sportsmanship, and other desirable traits of character. To test knowledge and skills learned in 4-H and FFA projects.

- 1. All contestants, except Cloverbuds / Boosters and participants in the Wool Lead Contest and All Fabric Show, <u>MUST</u> be a bonafide 4-H or FFA members of Chaves County, New Mexico and enrolled in 4-H or FFA for the current year and in good standing.
- 2. Exhibitors <u>MUST</u> fit into one of the age groups below:
 - Cloverbuds: 5 8 Kindergarten, 1st & 2nd grades; 5, 6, 7, or 8 years old & in the 2nd grade as of January 1, 2025. (Show amongst themselves no Premiums will be paid.)
 - Novice: 9 11 3rd, 4th, & 5th grades; 8 years old & in the 3rd grade, 9, 10, or 11 years old & in the 5th grade as of January 1, 2025
 - Junior: 12 13 6th & 7th grades; 11 years old & in the 6th grade, 12, or 13 years old & in the 7th grade as of January 1, 2025
 - Seniors: 14 18 8th grade & up; 13 years old & in the 8th grade, 14, 15, 16, 17, or 18 years old as of January 1, 2025.
- 3. Exhibitors <u>MUST</u> be enrolled in the 4-H or FFA project in which they wish to exhibit by March 31st (except for FFA, Rodeo, Wool Lead and All Fabric Show contestants).
- 4. Awards can be withheld from members with non-sportsman like conduct. The Fair Board will have the final decision.
- 5. All precautions will be taken, but the Fair Board will not be held responsible for loss or damage to exhibits.
- 6. All premiums listed are tentative and subject to change!
- 7. Showmanship Classes: All participants, except Cloverbuds / Boosters, must be enrolled in the project and show their own animals.
- 8. NO Golf carts, 4 wheelers, ATVs, etc.

RULES

- 1. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the project they are exhibiting and must have made their exhibit according to project guidelines for the current year.
- 2. Age Breakdown: See Rule #2 of General Rules. Cloverbuds / Boosters can enter any item made as a 4-H project in the Cloverbuds / Booster section, last page of Arts and Crafts. These items will be displayed only and each Cloverbuds / Booster will receive participation ribbons.
- 3. First through Sixth place ribbons will be given in each class unless items are obviously unworthy. First through fourth place are eligible to exhibit at the ENMSF and 1st place is eligible to exhibit at the State Fair.
- 4. Exhibitor may receive up to Three (3) premiums in each project. A 4-Her may enter as many items as they wish but only one item per class can be entered. With the exception of Cloverbuds, who may enter multiple items per class.
- 5. The exhibitor <u>MUST</u> label all items with their name / age / club before arrival at the County Fair (in case fair tag comes off).
- 6. All self-determined projects are to use form #300.sd-1(R-2018)
- 7. Best of Show Exhibits will be picked this year from the following classes: Animal Sciences, Horticulture, & Agronomy: Classes 1-244. Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math: Classes 300-356. Personal Growth and Development: Classes 400-530. Creative Arts: Classes 700-911 and 1040-1076 Photography: Classes 1000-1036. Sewing and Construction: Classes 1100-1181 Quilting: Classes 1182-1216. Food and Nutrition I: Classes 1217-1313. Food and Nutrition II: Classes 1315-1530. Consumer Education and Family Life: Classes 1600-1703 and 1898-1908. Arts and Crafts and County Only: Classes 1800-1825 and 2001-2034
- 8. Those receiving Best of Show will receive a rosette ribbon and \$25 premium.

- 1. All contestants except Boosters must be bonafide 4-H or FFA members of Chaves County, New Mexico, enrolled in club work for 2025, and in good standing. FFA participant do not have to have rodeo as their project BUT they must have basic First Aid training and a signed Rodeo Waiver on file at the Extension Office. State 4-H Rodeo rules will be followed except where modified for local conditions. Local rules will take precedence. Age Breakdown: See each event.
- 2. <u>ENTRIES:</u> Entries must be signed by either 4-H Leader or FFA Advisor. No refunds will be given without a signed certificate from the doctor or vet
- 3. RULES WILL BE THE SAME AS THE STATE 4-H RULES. Rules stated herein will be followed and discrepancy will be submitted to the arena director and judges immediately following the scheduled performance and their ruling will be final. Failure to adhere will result in disqualification. Protests, arguments, interference or disturbances of any sort in or out of the arena by contestants, parents, or guardians at any time between the opening and closing of the rodeo will not be tolerated.
- 4. Rodeo Director will NOT provide contestants with a team roping partner. Team Ropers must provide their own partners. Rodeo Director will approve team roper partners.

Chaves County 4-H & FFA Fair 2025 JUNIOR LIVESTOCK RULES

- 1. Any needed changes that arise from the rules or regulations will go to the Jr. Livestock Committee and the Chaves County 4-H & FFA Fair Board. Their decision will be final.
- 2. CONTESTANTS: All contestants in this department must be Bonafede 4-H or FFA members of Chaves County and will be subject to the rules as stated in this fair book. All entries must be certified by 4-H Organizational Leader or FFA Advisor plus the parent. 4-H CLOVERBUDS ARE ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE IN THE SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES ONLY.
- 3. RULES: The rules of the Chaves County 4-H & FFA Fair and the Junior Department govern, but the special rules of each division take precedence over all other rules. Department supervisors will interpret all rules under question or circumstances not covered by the rules.
- 4. EXHIBITS: Exhibits must be the handiwork of the exhibitor when mechanical skill is required, the grower where agriculture exhibits are required, and the owner and feeder where livestock is entered, and exhibitor must be enrolled in project area where he/she exhibits.
- 5. ENTRY SHEETS: All animals exhibited must be entered on 4-H or FFA entry sheet. Special care should be taken in filling out entry sheet to give exhibitors complete name, mailing address, include town and Zip code, FFA Chapter or 4-H Club and social security number, it is very important that you have your 4-H Agent or FFA Advisor sign your entry form before it is turned in.
- 6. ENTRY DATE: Livestock entries will close July 1, 2025. Late entries will be accepted but will be assessed a \$25 fee per family. Animals must be on the grounds Sunday, July 20, 2025 between 6:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m., but not before. All Animals must be on the fairgrounds by 12:00 noon. In case of an emergency, a 4-H Agent or FFA Advisor must be notified prior to 12:00 noon deadline. All decisions will be made by the executive Livestock Committee.
- 7. RELEASE: All livestock and exhibits will be <u>released</u> 8:00 a.m. Saturday, July 26, 2025 and must be <u>removed</u> by 1:00 p.m.
- 8. ENTRY FEE: An Entry fee of \$14 per head will be charged to junior exhibitors of market beef and dairy heifers. \$10 per head will be charged for all breeding stock, except for Breeding Heifers, which will be \$20.00 per head. A fee of \$10 per head will be charged to junior exhibitors of hogs, sheep and goats. \$6 per head will be charged for dairy goats. A fee of \$4 for meat rabbit pens and broiler poultry entries, with all others being \$2.00 per entry. Payable to 4H Council & Club Affiliated 4-H.

- 9. LOSS OR INJURY: Every precaution will be taken to protect exhibits from loss or injury, but the Chaves County 4-H & FFA Fair will not be responsible for loss or injury to any exhibit.
- 10. PREMIUMS: No exhibitor may receive more than 2 premiums in any lot.
- 11. CLASSES: Will be increased, combined, or dropped whenever deemed necessary. The decision will be at discretion of the Rules Committee.
- 12. State Livestock sanitary regulations will apply. Manure will not be allowed in the trash barrels on the fairgrounds.
- 13. EQUIPMENT: Exhibitors must furnish all water pails and feed boxes.
- 14. CARE OF EXHIBITS: Each exhibitor must exhibit and take care of his or her own animal unless excused by the Director for reasons that are deemed sufficient. If livestock is not properly cared for, labor, feed requirements and other necessary items will be supplied, with all costs therefore charged to such exhibitor.
- 15. All livestock must be owned by the exhibitor during the feeding period preceding the Fair and cannot change ownership or be transferred from one program to the other. The ownership period shall be:

Market Lamb by	June 1
Dairy Heifer by	
Meat Goat by	June 1

All entries must be certified as to eligibility by Extension Agent or FFA Advisor. No individual entries or entries without signature will be accepted. All animals must be owned, cared for and entered in the individual name of the owner.

- 16. Each exhibitor must be present to show, sell in sale, and load on packer truck their animals unless excused by the Director & Superintendent of each department. In case of violation of this rule, both premium money and sale of animal can be withheld from exhibitor.
- 17. Exhibitor must be present at time of check -in classification, and weigh-in. If an exhibitor is absent at any of the above stated times, the right to participate will be forfeited and no refund will be given. If project superintendent is noticed of absence prior to check-in, project superintendent will determine if exhibitor will be allowed to participate.
- 18. ADULT ASSISTANCE: No adult may assist in the showing any animal in the show ring. All adults must remain at least ten feet away from animals being shown. No one is allowed in the show ring but holders, the judge and show officials.

- 19. OFFICIAL WEIGHTS: Minimum: Sheep 80#; Pigs 190#, Steers 800#, Meat Goats 40#. An official weigh master will be used for all classes of livestock. Reweigh will only be given at the time the animal is weighed and must be requested at the time. To reweigh, the animal will be backed off the scale, the scale will be re-balanced and then the animal reweighed.
- 20. SIFTING COMMITTEE: All animals entered in this department will be reviewed by a sifting committee or classified and inferior animals will be eliminated and must be removed from the fairgrounds. Any animal that has been through a prior Junior Livestock Sale will be eliminated.
- 21. Exhibitors will stand the loss on any animal if its carcass is condemned.
- 22. The withdrawal times for all medications given to show animals will be followed. Any animal given medication will be reported to the superintendent with the type of medication, dosage and withdrawal time.
- 23. No medication will be administered without approval of superintendent.
- 24. ALL ENTRY FORMS on animals will be signed only by the exhibitor, exhibitor's parent, exhibitor's FFA Advisor or 4-H Agent.
- 25. All sale animals may be permanently identified.
- 26. No change of the major color pattern of the animal by paint or dyeing will be allowed. Any grooming material that allows color to come off from any animal will not be allowed at the show.
- 27. All animals properly entered in any show class and eligible for competition must be brought into the ring and stay for the duration of the competition. Exhibitors refusing to follow the above stated guideline for any cause that does not meet with the approval and consent of the director, will forfeit any prizes previously won and may also be barred from further participation in the show. Exhibitor may be required to remove their livestock from the grounds if deemed necessary by director and / or fair officials.
- 28. The fitting of animals is the responsibility of the exhibitor. When instruction and/or assistance are required, the exhibitor must be present and involved in the process. If exhibitor is found in violation of this rule, they will be warned by the director. If director notes a second offense, exhibitor may be barred from showing the animal involved. The decision will be made by both the department director and fair officials. Exhibitors in the show ring who are also showing in the next class maybe exempt from this guideline. NO PAID PROFESSIONAL FITTING HELP IS ALLOWED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS.
- 29. <u>INSPECTION</u> All animals must follow the New Mexico Livestock Board guide. NEW MEXICO LIVESTOCK BOARD guide for livestock Exhibitors.
- 30. <u>ATTIRE</u> All participants <u>will be</u> appropriately attired. Please see the 4-H and FFA dress codes.
- 31. Showmanship will be held at the conclusion of each show. All participants, except Cloverbuds / boosters and under, must be enrolled in the project and show their own animals. ** Three (3) or more is needed to have a class, if less are participating then they will be combined with

- 6. All rabbits must have a legible tattoo in the left ear for identification of ownership and must be cleaned up of any extra ink. If tattoo is illegible, it will be disqualified. Tattooing will not be allowed on premises prior to show.
- 7. There will be three categories of rabbits to be judged: Meat pens, Commercial breed, and Fancy breed.
- 8. Meat Pens must be owned and in the possession of the exhibitor since birth of the rabbits. Entry is limited to <u>2</u> meat pens per exhibitor. All other rabbits must be owned at least 6 weeks prior to County Fair.
- 9. *Director reserves the right to refuse entry of rabbits deemed harmful to other entries because of illness, disease, or parasites.
- 10. Exhibitors are responsible for **animals'** care while at the fair including feeding, watering and cleaning the area around and under cages daily.
- 11. Exhibitors will need to bring their rabbits to and from the judging table. The breed will be called no more than three (3) times.
- 12. Appropriate show attire is required for all exhibitors, especially during showmanship competition.
- 13. All entries will be judged by ARBA standards. PLEASE CHECK THE ARBA GUIDEBOOK for age, weight, and other data on entries.
- 14. Absolutely no rabbits will be allowed on grounds except those entered in competition.

^{*}Any rabbits that have shown signs of illness or has had an illness (treated or untreated) within two weeks prior to the date brought to the fairgrounds, entry will not be permitted.

- 1. Participants must be eligible to show at the 2025 Eastern New Mexico State Fair and must be a 4-H or FFA member in good standing.
- 2. All pigs must be tagged in at dates/times designated, which would make them eligible for the New Mexico State Fair and the Eastern New Mexico State Fair.
- 3. All pigs must be entered in the 2025 Chaves County 4-H & FFA Fair.
- 4. All breeds will be shown against one another. There will be no breed classes.
- 5. All participants will pay a separate \$20.00 entry fee at the fair. All entry fees will be paid back to placings. If a minimal number of pigs are entered, only Grand & Reserve Grand will be paid.
- 6. The show will be handled as a jackpot.
- 7. Pigs cannot weigh over 189 lbs. (not eligible for County Fair.)
- 8. Class breaks will be determined by number of entries and weight.

- 14. All dairy goats shall be tattooed in accordance with the current NM Livestock Board Guide for Livestock Exhibitors.
- 15. Dairy Goats will be released immediately following the Dairy Goat Show.

- 1. Breeds must be stated on the entry form. Pullets and cockerels are birds less than one year of age. Each bird must be marked with a leg band for identification purposes. Bands may be homemade and the number or a description of the band listed on the entry form.
- 2. All birds must be in good health and of show quality. Any birds having pests or disease will be asked to leave the fairgrounds.
- 3. Pens will be assigned and marked with a poultry-judging card. DO NOT remove the judging cards or relocate birds without the approval of the Superintendent.
- 4. MAINTENANCE AND CLEANUP In order to keep the barn in its new condition, we ask that all participants, and family members, exercise a higher standard of cleanup throughout fair week. The goal will be to eliminate all water spills, all feed/grain spills and maintain daily removal of waste and all loose feathers. The barn floor has been levelled, so we hope the New Guidelines will help eliminate the past process of raking and shoveling the barn floor. These new guidelines will include "No tying of pens to the wire tables". Please add to your list of equipment to bring with you: Your own feed and water containers to be fastened firmly in each pen at check-in, a dustpan and medium bristled brush for daily cleanup.
- 5. <u>BROILER PEN</u>: Three birds that are seven (7) to nine (9) weeks of age by show day. Broilers must be owned and in the possession of the Exhibitor from the date of delivery from the hatchery. A copy of the receipt showing proof of delivery from the hatchery must be attached to the entry form. The goal of a broiler pen is for each bird to weigh at least four (4) pounds each and not more than six (6) pounds each and to match the birds as closely as possible by a) size of breast, b) uniform weight, and c) appearance. A pen made up of pullets and cockerels will be disqualified. A pen of three (3) perfectly matched birds will have the highest chance of winning, even if they weigh more or less than six (6) pounds each. To assist the judge, you must mark the weights of each broiler, according to their leg band identification, to the back of your

Chaves County 4-H & FFA Fair 2025 poultry-judging card by 2:00 p.m. on show day.

- 6. No Exhibitor may receive more than two (2) premiums in any lot (See Paragraph 10, Page 35, of the Junior Livestock Rules). A bird unworthy of an award shall not receive an award, even if there is no competition in its class. No bird shall receive an award greater than its merits justify.
- 7. The show will be "Closed Barn," which means all Exhibitors and the public will not be allowed in the barn while the show is being judged. Any person interfering with the entries or the judging process during the show could result in the disqualification of an Exhibitors entries.
- 8. <u>SHOWMANSHIP</u>: In order to fairly conduct showmanship classes there should be a minimum of three exhibitors entered in each age group. If there are less than three entered in any one age group, the Superintendent may combine two age groups to make one class. Winners will be announced at the Awards Program.
- 9. Before poultry is released on Saturday by 1:00 p.m., each Exhibitor will be required to brush all waste from the wire in each pen, remove all feathers from the wire and neatly sweep all waste from under each pen. Exhibitors MUST check with the Superintendent before leaving the barn so their area may be inspected before being RELEASED.
- 10. Exhibitors are reminded to refer to the General Rules (Page 3) and the Junior Livestock Rules (Page 38) for more information concerning participation in the fair. The barn will be closed and locked each night by 9:30 p.m. and re-opened by 7:00 a.m. each morning.

Friday, July 25, 2025, 7:00 p.m.

- 1. The Junior Livestock Sale will be held at the Sale Ring at Eastern New Mexico State Fairgrounds at 7:00 p.m. on Friday, July 25, 2025.
- 2. Ten (10) steers, twenty-five (25) sheep, twenty-five (25) pigs, two (2) poultry pens, two (2) rabbit meat pens, fourteen (14) dairy heifers, and twelve (12) meat goats will be sold. All animals must be sold through the regular sale unless the exhibitor notifies the director of the department to the contrary by ONE HOUR AFTER THE STEER SHOW AND NO LATER THAN 12:00 P.M. (NOON). There will be NO changes to the sale pull sheet once you have signed, it is final.

Grand and Reserve Grand Champions may not be withdrawn.

- 3. An exhibitor can sell two animals (of which only 1 can be a steer/dairy heifer). Only animals entered in the individual name of the owner are eligible. Exhibitors are required to sell their own animals unless excused by the Junior Livestock Committee for documented reasons. If a single exhibitor has more than two Grand Champion animals, he/she may choose which two animals to sell. An exhibitor showing both the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion of a specific species may pull the Reserve Grand Champion, if he/she so chooses, but will not be allowed to sell a lower placing of the same species.
- 4. Market livestock will be sold on a percentage of breed basis and proportioned among weight classes in the following order (this order is rotated on a yearly basis): Grand Champion Market Beef; Grand Champion Market Lamb; Grand Champion Market Swine, Grand Champion Dairy Heifer, Grand Champion Meat Goat, Reserve Grand Champion Market Beef, Reserve Grand Champion Market Lamb, Reserve Grand Champion Market Swine, Reserve Grand Champion Dairy Heifer, Reserve Grand Champion Meat Goat, Grand Champion Meat Pen, Grand Champion Broiler, Reserve Grand Champion Meat Pen and Reserve Grand Champion Broiler.
- 5. The **packer's** bid will not be available before Friday noon. All sales for animals not going through the Junior Livestock Sale must be handled by the seller in direct negotiation with the packer or other purchaser. <u>All Sale animals need to be returned to the sale holding area until released by the Junior Livestock Sales Committee and office.</u>
- 6. All animals will be weighed at the fairgrounds and these weights recorded and filed by an official in charge of scales. These weights will be the official weights for animals going through the sale.

- 7. Maximum weight of steers to be paid on is 1,300 pounds. Maximum weight of market swine to be paid on is 290 pounds. Maximum weight of market lambs to be paid on is 130 pounds.
- 8. Exhibitors are responsible for the care and safe delivery of all sold animals before and after the sale. SOLD ANIMALS WILL BE RELEASED FOR PROPER DELIVERY TO PURCHASER BY 1 PM SATURDAY, JULY 26, 2025. Failure of the exhibitor to comply with this rule will necessitate withholding a portion of the sale price to apply toward expenses incurred.
- 9. Checks for sale animals will be mailed from the Chaves County 4-H & FFA Sale officials to sale participants after thank-you letters are written. Thank you notes must be written and mailed and sale check cashed by 12/31/25 or money will be forfetted.
- 10. In the event an eligible animal dies before the sale, the next placed animal in the same class will automatically move into the sale. Should an animal which has been sold die before it is delivered, the sale monies will be refunded to the buyer and the exhibitor will suffer the loss.
- 11. Buyers will be expected to settle with the Fair committee immediately after the sale. Direct transactions with seller are not permitted.
- 12. In the event a buyer resells to a packer or processor, the packer price will be deducted from the amount owed.
- 13. Any exhibitor having an animal or animals entered in the sale is prohibited from seeking special privileges from buyers, such as, but not limited to, asking permission to repurchase the animal from the buyer or packer to be shown again or to be used for other purposes. Any exhibitor or parent who seeks such privileges will be subject to such disciplinary action as deemed necessary by the Sales Committee, including, but not limited to, withholding of sale monies.
- 14. Any animal that has been through a premium sale shall not be eligible to sell in the County Fair as this is considered a disruption of ownership.
- 15. Sale animals must be show ring ready (no glitter, coloring, etc.).
- 16. **Buyers' gifts will not be allowed on sale night. Should the exhibitor choose to** gift buyer or buyers, the gift will be personally delivered by exhibitor at a later time.
- 17. No add-on monies will be allowed on non-sale animals.
- 18. Five percent (5%) will be deducted from sale price to help defray sale cost.
