4-H Cloverbud Participation

PURPOSE OF THE CLOVERBUD PROGRAM:
The overall purpose of the 4-H Cloverbud program is to foster the development of life skills that are essential for the cognitive, social, emotional, and physical maturation of kindergarten through 2nd graders by providing a unique educational opportunity. Children in these grades are a distinct audience for 4-H, with unique learning characteristics and developmental needs that are different from older children and youth served through 4-H membership. As a result, the 4-H Cloverbuds program is designed with specific educational objectives and program policies focused on the kindergarten-2nd grade child.

Reminder: Cloverbuds in Chaves County have their own age appropriate projects in which they are enrolled. Chaves County Cloverbuds meet every other month to develop life skills and complete their projects during county club meetings, where 4-H project workshops (sewing, leathercraft, dog, shooting sports, etc.) are scheduled for traditional members (those who are 8 and in the 3rd grade or 9 to 18.) The Cloverbud program is a great opportunity and makes it easier for our Cloverbuds to transition into becoming a traditional 4-H member.

In order for members to participate in the 4-H events (State Shoot, District Contest, State Conference, County Fair etc.) they will need to be active in their club meetings and activities. Club leaders will be signing off on member eligibility to attend these events so make sure you attend your meetings.

4-H MEMBER AGES FOR 2024-2025 4-H YEAR

CLOVERBUDS: 5 to 8, years old AND in Kindergarten, 1st or 2nd grade

(Born in 2017 or 2018 or 2019 or 2020)

NOVICE: 9 to 11 years old or 8 years old AND in the 3rd grade.

(Born in 2014, 2015, 2016 OR born in 2017 AND in 3rd grade)

JUNIOR: 12 and 13 years old or 11 years old AND in 6th grade.

(Born in 2012, 2013 or born in 2014 AND in the 6th grade)

SENIOR: 14 to 18 years old or 13 years old AND in 8th grade

(Born in 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011 or born 2012 AND in 8th grade)

Youth who are 19 as of January 1st of the current 4-H year (2025) are NOT eligible to enroll as a 4-H member. If you were born in 2006 or before, you are too old for the 2024-2025 4-H year. BUT, we would love to have you as a leader/volunteer!

'24-'25 4-H Enrollment!

IMPORTANT!

October 1st starts the new 4-H year.

You MUST be enrolled each year!

FIRST - According to State 4-H policy, a 4-H member shall attend at least 40% of all club meetings and activities. Clubs may have more stringent rules, according to their bylaws. This means that you must regularly attend 4-H club meetings and activities to reap the benefits of 4-H, such as exhibiting at the fairs. This rule is designed to encourage youth to actively participate in 4-H activities to gain more from the 4-H program! If a 4-H member does not meet this requirement, you will not be a member in good standing.

SECOND - The <u>enrollment deadline is March 31, 2025</u>. 4-H members must enroll by the deadline in order to participate in County, State, and Eastern Fairs. This deadline is designed to encourage youth to enroll earlier and have more time to participate in their club and county 4-H activities. Enrolling early will enable you to get your project information quicker.



Agronomy	This contest consists of plant, seed, farm equipment, and insect identification as well as three placing classes from the following classes: grain crops, forage crops, and fruit or vegetable crops.					
Clothing Construction/ Fashion Revue	Member must be enrolled in the 4-H clothing project and complete a garment in one of the following clothing projects: Sewing I or II; Mix & Match I or II; Let's Make a T-shirt; Sew 'N Go; Serger Sewing; Creative Touches; Quilting; Sr Clothing Construction I or II; Clothing SD					
Consumer Decision Making	This contest has members learn decision making skills to become good consumers. Contestants place classes of different items one might purchase based on a scenarios needs.					
Entomology	This contest tests the member's knowledge of insects commonly found in NM. The participant will ID and answer one question per specimen. There is an additional test of 25 questions concerning collection and mounting techniques taken from Entomology I project material.					
Family Consumer Science Bowl	This is a team event where the objective is to provide 4-H members with an opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge in home environment, food, nutrition, clothing, health and child development.					
Family Consumer Science Skill-A-Thon	This is a team event where the objective is to provide 4-H Members with an opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge in home environment, food, nutrition, clothing, health and child development.					
Fashion Magic (Seniors)	This contest involves 3 phrases of judging: Garment/ Accessories, Notebook; Interview. Each phase will be evaluated using the project evaluation form. All contestants must complete the Fashion Magic project in "Wardrobe Planning" before enrolling in "Clothing Coordination" or "In the Marketplace".					
Favorite Foods	The objective of this contest is to allow 4-Hers the opportunity to experience meal planning and presentation while preparing a dish that they like. 4-Hers learn about food preparation and nutrition while preparing for the show.					
Hippology (Seniors)	Hippology is a contest of knowledge and understanding of equine science and husbandry.					
Horse Bowl	This contest is a team event in which members demonstrate their knowledge of the horse and the horse project in a 'Jeopardy' type format.					
Horse Judging	This contest consists of placing classes of horses at halter and performance. Performance classes may consist of Western Pleasure, Western Riding, Western Reining, or Hunter Under Saddle.					
Horticulture	This contest consists of identifying fruits, nuts, vegetables, herbs, and common houseplants found in most grocery stores, florist shops.					
Land (Seniors)	This contest consists of evaluating soil characteristics such as soil texture, structure, depth, permeability, reaction, degree or erosion, slope, drainage and flooding to classify the land into capability classes.					
Livestock	Classes of market &/or breeding beef, sheep, and swine are judged to develop decision making skills.					
Livestock Skill-A-Thon	This contest provides an opportunity for youth enrolled in 4-H to develop their livestock production skills and incorporates meats and wool judging, tool and livestock breed ID, and much more!					
Meats ID	This contest consists of evaluating classes of retail cuts and ID individual cuts of beef, lamb, and pork.					
Parliamentary Procedure	This is a team event in which youth conduct a meeting according to the items of business presented and will execute the motions and actions required.					
Poetry (Novice & Jr's)	Contestants will present either an original poem or one obtained from a book. The poem must be memorized and the participant may not use notes.					
Presentations	This contest consists of 2 different presentation types: Demonstration or Illustrated talk. NOTE: The member must be enrolled in the project area in which the presentation is given.					
Public Speaking	Participants present an original prepared speech that is no longer that 7 minutes in length.					
Talent Show (SR)	To encourage 4-H members to discover and develop their talents.					
Wildlife Habitat Evaluation	The purpose of the wildlife contest is to stimulate wildlife knowledge and participation in the 4-H Wildlife project area.

Chaves County Sharp Shooters

Shooting Sports Project Descriptions

There are many questions about the Shooting Sports Projects. Below is some basic information that will help 4-H members decide which project they may be interested in.

- 4-H members enrolled in any of the Shooting Sports Projects MUST complete the following BEFORE attending practices
 - o complete 4-H enrollment for the new year in its entirety
 - o attend 1 Chaves County 4-H Shooting Sports Safety Meeting each year
 - pay dues before shooting at a 4-H event.
 - successfully complete a New Mexico Department of Game and Fish Hunter Education Course before shooting at a 4-H event.
 - Sign and Turn in liability waivers for specific disciplines
- Participants are required to have attended a minimum of **FOUR** practices in their discipline in order to compete at District or State Competition.
- Cloverbud 4-H members may not enroll in any shooting sports projects or shoot at any 4-H event.

Archery – The archery project allows 4-H members to learn the proper equipment selection and care, shooting techniques, safety, and good sportsmanship. Any novice, junior, or senior 4-H member may enroll and participate. There is a district archery contest for novice and junior members and a state contest for senior members.

Hunting - The hunting discipline combines knowledge and understanding of hunting skills, wildlife ID and management, and orienteering which may include .22 rifle, muzzleloading, shotgun, or archery. Senior 4-H members may participate as long as they enroll in the Wildlife and shooting discipline projects. There is a state competition for senior 4-H members.

Muzzleloading – This project teaches the 4-H members the fundamentals of firing a muzzleloader, safety, gun care, black powder history, and more. Any novice, junior, and senior 4-H member may enroll in Muzzleloading, but there is no shooting contest at the district level for novice and junior 4-H members. There is a state competition for senior 4-H'ers.

Pistol – The pistol project teaches 4-H members the fundamentals of shooting a pistol, safety, and good sportsmanship. The project may include shooting .22 pistol outdoors and air pistol indoors. In Chaves County, this project is open only to senior 4-H members. There is a state competition in both .22 pistol and air pistol.

Rifle – The rifle project teaches 4-H members the fundamentals of shooting a rifle, safety, and good sportsmanship. The project includes shooting both .22 rifle outdoors and air rifle indoors. Any novice, junior, or senior 4-H member may enroll and participate. There is a district rifle contest in both .22 and air rifle for novice and junior members and a state contest in both .22 rifle and air rifle for senior members.

Shotgun – The shotgun project allows 4-H members to learn the fundamentals of shooting a shotgun, along with safety and good sportsmanship. 4-H members learn about and shoot the various types of shotguns. Any novice, junior, and senior 4-H member may enroll in shotgun. There is a district shotgun contest for novice & junior 4-H members and a state competition for senior 4-H'ers.

Charlie Heimark did a demonstration on his rabbit project. Blake Heimark did a demonstration on goat milk soap. The next meeting is scheduled for March 13th, we will be discussing indoor projects for the fair.

Spurring to Success Reporter: Sara Knight

Spurring to Success called their meeting to order at 6:36. Sara Knight went over the treasurer's report. Old business was discussed then we moved onto new business. Community service projects were discussed, Faye, Logan and Cannon will be doing further research on their assigned charitable organization and reporting back to the club at our next meeting. Sara Knight demonstrated how to feed a baby boer goat and answered questions regarding her demonstration. Abby Bierwirth demonstrated what she keeps in her animal first aid bag and answered questions on what the various items were used for.Once those demonstrations were completed, Nelson Bierwirth talked about what vaccinations were most common for animals and which were important for animals living in the Southwest. He provided oranges and syringes so that our club could practice giving vaccinations. What is a Rangeland?

Rangeland is all of the land in the world that is not farmland, dense forest, barren desert, or land covered by solid rock, concrete, or glaciers. Rangelands include grasslands, shrublands, savannas, and open woodlands. Almost half of the land on Earth is rangeland and one third of the United States is rangeland!

Rangelands are important for many reasons:

- Raising livestock. Rangeland in the western states is home to more than half of the beef cattle and most of the sheep and goats in the country. Livestock raised on rangeland supply meat and animal products (like wool and leather) to America and the world.
- Wildlife habitat. Rangelands provides a home for countless mammals, birds, amphibians, fish and insects.
- Clean air and water. Rangelands are located mostly in the western United States.
 Since the western U.S. has a much drier climate than the eastern U.S., water is extremely precious there. That is why it is important to pay attention to the amount and quality of water that flows off of rangeland.
- Recreation. Rangelands are important for hiking, hunting, camping, mountain biking, cross-county skiing, and snowmobiling.
- Mining and energy. Rangelands provide minerals for technology and industry through mining. The wind and sun in the rangelands also provide renewable energy.

Who takes care of rangelands?

Rangelands need people who care about them to make sure we can enjoy them--and the animals and plants that live on them--for many years.

Ranching families own rangelands and have cared for the same land for many years. Some families have lived on their and for 100 years or more! Many of our rangelands also are public lands. Public lands are not owned by a family, but belong to all of us. The government cares for our public rangelands. They hire people who studied about rangelands in college to work with ranching families and the government.
