## **4-H Cloverbud Participation**

PURPOSE OF THE CLOVERBUD PROGRAM: The overall purpose of the 4-H Cloverbud program is to foster the development of life skills that are essential for the cognitive, social, emotional, and physical maturation of kindergarten through 2nd graders by providing a unique educational opportunity. Children in these grades are a distinct audience for 4-H, with unique learning characteristics and developmental needs that are different from older children and youth served through 4-H membership. As a result, the 4-H Cloverbuds program is designed with specific educational objectives and program policies focused on the kindergarten-2nd grade child.

Reminder: Cloverbuds in Chaves County have their own age appropriate projects in which they are enrolled. Chaves County Cloverbuds meet every other month to develop life skills and complete their projects during county club meetings, where 4-H project workshops (sewing, leathercraft, dog, shooting sports, etc.) are scheduled for traditional members (those who are 8 and in the 3rd grade or 9 to 18. ) The Cloverbud program is a great opportunity and makes it easier for our Cloverbuds to transition into becoming a traditional 4-H member.



# 4-H Member Ages For 2025-2026 4-H Year

CLOVERBUDS: 5 to 8, years old AND in Kindergarten, 1st or 2nd grade (Born in 2018, 2019, 2020 or 2021)

NOVICE: 9 to 11 years old or 8 years old AND in the 3rd grade. (Born in 2015, 2016, 2017 OR born in 2018 AND in the 3<sup>rd</sup> grade)

JUNIOR: 12 and 13 years old or 11 years old AND in 6th grade. (Born in 2013, 2014 or born in 2015 AND in the 6<sup>th</sup> grade)


SENIOR: 14 to 18 years old or 13 years old AND in 8th grade (Born in 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012 or born in 2013 AND in  $8^{th}$  grade)

Youth who are 19 as of January 1st of the current 4-H year (2026) are NOT eligible to enroll as a 4-H member. If you were born in 2007 or before, you are too old for the 2025-2026 4-H year. BUT, we would love to have you as a leader/volunteer!

The Chaves County 4-H Council is excited to announce that Fall Formal is back!

- 1 ticket will be available for purchase by each enrolled Senior 4-H member (8th grade - 12th grade).
- An additional 1 ticket may be purchased by an enrolled 4-H Senior in order to bring one non-4-H Senior age member as a friend.
   Friend's name will need to be recorded at the time of ticket purchase.
- Tickets are \$25 each until October 13th and are available at the Ext. Office. All tickets are non-refundable and non-transferable meaning a 4-H senior can't transfer their ticket to a non-4-H'er.
- Conduct expected at the Fall Formal will be in accordance with the 4-H code of conduct, as it is a 4-H sponsored event. Youth who do not follow guidelines will be asked to leave.
- Required dress attire is FORMAL for all attendees. Those not dressed appropriately will not be allowed to enter and ticket refunds will not be given.
  - Required MALE attire: button down shirt with collar, tie, jacket (optional), dress pants or dark jeans (no holes), belt and dress shoes/boots. Shorts and tennis shoes are not allowed.
  - Required FEMALE attire: Formal dress or skirt of at least mid-thigh length or slacks or dress jeans.
     Formal dress with spaghetti straps may be worn, but no strapless or backless. Appropriate footwear and blouse/top to accompany outfit.



### Speak Up for Success: Using "I" Messages and Finding Win-Win Solutions

When preparing for your future, learning how to express yourself clearly and solve problems peacefully is just as important as choosing a career path. Whether you're working on a group project, interviewing for a job, or asking for help at work, how you communicate can make a big difference. Two powerful tools for career readiness are "I" messages and win-win

### What are "I" Messages?

"I" messages are a way of expressing how you feel without blaming or attacking the other (I Feel ...) person. They help you take responsibility for your own emotions and needs, and they make it easier for others to hear you without feeling defensive. Instead of saying, "YOU NEVER LISTEN TO ME!" try:

### "I feel frustrated when I'm interrupted because I want to finish my thought."

Using "I" messages shows maturity, self-awareness, and good communication, skills employers look for and friends respect. They help build trust and make conversations more productive, especially when things get tense.

### What is a Win-Win Situation?

A win-win solution is when everyone involved in a disagreement gets something they need. It's not about one person winning and the other losing, it's about working together so everyone feels heard and respected. Let's say you're on a team and two of you want to lead. Instead of arguing, you talk it out and agree to split the responsibilities. That's a win-win. You both get to lead and the team benefits from your combined skills.

### Why It Matters for Your Future

In school, jobs, or any future path you take, you'll face challenges and disagreements. Learning how to use "I" messages helps you stand up for yourself without tearing others down. Finding win-win solutions shows you're a problem solver who works well with others, exactly the kind of person colleges and employers want.

So next time you feel upset or stuck in a conflict, try using an "I" message and look for a win-win solution. You'll build stronger relationships, improve your confidence, and prepare for success, now and in your future career.



## Sheep Make Milk Too!





Many people hear the word "milk" and think of cows. However, milk comes from a lot of other animals. Sheep give milk that can sometimes be even healthier than cow's milk.

Many people choose milk from sheep or goats because they are lactose intolerant. This means that their bodies cannot process the substance called lactase in cow's milk. Sheep milk has a much lower percent of lactase than cow's milk. This makes it easier for people who are lactose intolerant to digest the milk.

Sheep milk is often used for making cheese. Especially in places like England, farmers are raising sheep for milk that is made into cheese and yogurt. They use a type of sheep called Frieslands. These sheep have two or three lambs at a time, so they produce a lot of milk.

Now, more sheep farmers are discovering that it can be healthy to drink, too. Some people might not drink it because it contains about 4 percent more fat than cow's milk. Even though it is a bit fattier, sheep's milk also has nutrients that are good for you. Nutrients, such as calcium and phosphorus, can help your bones grow strong. Sheep milk contains about 3 percent more protein than milk from cows. Proteins are very important for building healthy muscles. Also, sheep milk contains more grams of Vitamin A and 41 more grams of Vitamin C than cow's milk per serving.
